Conferences, Trainings, Seminars and Workshops

- **Haiti Relief Efforts – State of Alabama**

The State of Alabama is working with the U.S. Department of State and the U.S. Agency on International Development (USAID). Currently this is a federal effort. Once needs are better identified, a plan for Alabama to directly assist in relief efforts may be implemented.

At this time, the State Department is unable to accept volunteers or goods, but is requesting cash donations for the Red Cross. Additionally, the State Department is not keeping a volunteer registry. Instead, they are asking individuals interested in assisting be directed to www.USAID.gov where they can register with one of the credible listed organizations. Alabama is not establishing an independent volunteer and donations registry, as that may hinder the relief efforts being coordinated federally.

If you have any questions regarding this issue please contact the 2-1-1- network by dialing 2-1-1- or 1-866-869-4921. Also, citizens can make an immediate cash

donation to the Red Cross by texting the word “**Haiti**” to “**90999**.” This will send \$10 to the Red Cross, and the donation will appear on your next cell phone bill.

- **Alabama AmeriCorps State Grant**

The Alabama Governor’s Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives (GFBCI) is the state office that manages programs and initiatives designed to increase the number of Alabamians engaged in service and volunteering. Each year, as the State Service Commission, GFBCI awards AmeriCorps grants to nonprofit and public agencies that identify an unmet need in their community that will be addressed by AmeriCorps members that the organization recruits, trains, and manages.

AmeriCorps grants provide funding for items such as program staff, member living allowances, health insurance for full-time members, equipment, supplies and other associated program expenses. In the FY 2010 grant competition, the funding priorities are projects that address compelling, unmet needs in one or a combination of the following five national service priority areas: Education, Healthy Futures, Clean Energy/Environment, Veterans, and Opportunity.

The application deadline for the **Formula Grants**, are due in e-Grants and hard copy *with additional application documents* to GFBCI Office by 5:00pm CST on April 1, 2010.

Grants and Funding Opportunities

Community Development and Housing

- **Second Chance Act Mentoring Grants to Nonprofit Organizations**

The Second Chance Act of 2007, (Pub. L. 110-199) provides a comprehensive response to the increasing number of people who are released from prison and jail and returning to communities. There are currently over 2.3 million individuals serving time in our federal and state prisons, and millions of people cycling through local jails every year. Ninety-five percent of all prisoners incarcerated today will eventually be released and will return to communities. The Second Chance Act will help ensure the transition individuals make from prison or jail to the community is safe and successful. Section 211 of the Act authorizes grants to nonprofit organizations and federally recognized Indian tribes that may be used for mentoring projects to promote the safe and successful reintegration into the community of adults who have been incarcerated.
